Traditional forest resources	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ▪ Retain cedar and maintain a supply for cultural uses, e.g. Monumental Cedar, Culturally Modified Trees ▪ Protect archaeological and historical artifacts ▪ Maintain a supply of traditional resources, e.g. plant foods, medicinal plants

Name of Land Use Objective	Values and features and intent of protection
Sensitive/Important fisheries watersheds	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ▪ Maintain ecological functioning and water quality and quantity in fish-bearing streams (High Quality Fish Habitat), sensitive watersheds, and special aquatic features including forested swamps, wetlands, upland streams, and active fluvial units ▪ Maintain ecological function in biologically diverse forests next to these features

Biodiversity Objectives

Name of Land Use Objective	Values and features and intent of protection
Landscape level biodiversity	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ▪ Protect values at different scales, from landscape to stand level ▪ Ensure all forest types are represented across the landscape, ensure old-growth is represented, and not too much medium-aged forests because they don't provide high quality habitat ▪ Maintain presence of endangered and threatened plant communities ▪ Maintain standing trees within a cutblock as mini-refuges for wildlife and to mimic natural disturbance patterns ▪ Maintain grizzly and Kermode habitat

Stand level retention	
Grizzly bear and Kermode habitat
